Our Curriculum Journey	Journey: The children will begin their journey by exploring various Egyptian patterns and copying hieroglyphs. They will achieve this through a quick sketching activity. They will then take this a little further by looking at different sarcophagus and sketching their own design for theirs. After this the children will be taught what clay modelling is and have the opportunity to practise some of their ideas. Finally the children will be modelling their final sarcophagus designs using clay. They will then use etching tools to create their intricate designs and will then paint them for display.

Expected Example			
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Batik is the art of decorating cloth by painting patterns & blocking out areas using a substance that resists dye, e.g. wax. The resist prevents dye from reaching the cloth, so creating patterns. Evidence of batik has been found from over 2000 yrs ago. There are many e.g.s of batik found in Africa. Diff materials are used as a resist, e.g. cassava paste (root plant), rice paste, river mud (<http://www.batikguild.org.uk/historyAfrica.asp>). Demo batik techniques using flour as a resist (follow step-by-step process <http://eyes aflame.blogspot.com/2008/06/demo-flour-paste-batik.html>). Dyes can stain clothing and furniture so make sure tables are well covered and chn wear protective clothing.
