

Commonly known as the Rockies, the Rocky Mountains are located on the western side of North America. The mountain system stretches from British Columbia in Canada, down to New Mexico in the United States. They pass through the Canadian state of Alberta as well as the US states of Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Utah and Colorado. The Rockies are sometimes referred to as the backbone of North America. They measure around 3000 miles (4800km) in length.
