Alan Turing: -



- Was a British Mathematician and computer scientist Born June 23, 1912, London, England—died June 7, 1954, Wilmslow, Cheshire)
- At the outbreak of war with Germany in September 1939, he moved to the organization's wartime headquarters at Bletchley Park, Buckinghamshire.
- Turing essentially pioneered the idea of computer memory. In 1936, Turing published a seminal paper called "On Computable Numbers" which The Washington Post has called "the founding document of the computer age."
